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Six Subvention Awards Made for 2004 Meeting!!!

Members may recall that in 2003 no subvention awards were made because no applications were received. This year we did not have this problem. The committee (Chair Cynthia Shwenk; members Judy Gaughan and Randall Howarth) reviewed 8 applications, all of which described strong candidates for our support. The committee took note of the lack of awards in the previous year, the steady growth of the Vanguard account wherein the fund is invested, member input generally, and decided to award a total of \$1125.00 to six of the eight candidates we considered. Even with this level of support, the investment account will have increased by a net 3-4% from the 2003 meeting to that of 2004. Minutes 2003 AAH Business Meeting

Meeting called to order at 4:25.

MSP (Bennett, Twyman) to approve the minutes of the 2002 meeting.

President Jennifer Roberts called for a moment of silence for Meyer Reinhold and Judith Ginsberg.

REPORTS

<u>President's Report:</u> Roberts announced that Phyllis Culham will be organizing a panel on ancient diplomacy for the January 2004 APA meeting. There will also be a second ancient history panel organized by Steven Garfinkle. The organizers will attempt to schedule these panels on the same day and possibly arrange a reception as well. The APA has begun a new outreach effort and has a new periodical, <u>Amphora</u>. Non-APA members are encouraged to pick up a copy from the exhibit area. APA has also begun a Speaker's Bureau. AAH members are encouraged to tell APA about any outreach efforts. Roberts also described Chad Fauber's on-line text project; materials are available in the exhibit area.

<u>Secretary-Treasurer's Report</u>: Dintrone presented the annual report, with a correction to the total membership number. She pointed out that the number of members was continuing to decline and suggested that members encourage graduate students and colleagues to join. With the use of emails it may also be possible to invite lapsed members to rejoin.

Subvention Report: Schwenk reported that there were no applicants for the subvention grants in 2003. There was considerable discussion about what to do to increase applications. MSW (Bennett, Cargill) to set the amount at \$500.00; motion withdrawn. The Committee was encouraged to consider raising the amount offered, giving a specific range based on need, and/or contacting students on the program to encourage them to apply.

<u>Webmaster's Report</u>: Kinzl was unable to attend the meeting. Roberts reminded members to keep their on-line information up-to-date, and that updating AAH information does not update the on-line directory.

<u>Publications Committee Report</u>: Roberts reported that there are no publications nearing completion, although Badian continues to work on his Alexander volume. She encouraged members with ideas for future volumes to contact her.

Election: Dintrone reported that only one nomination for Secretary-Treasurer was received, and that under the AAH election procedure, Randall Howarth was declared elected. The Association welcomed Howarth and thanked Dintrone for her service.

<u>Old Business</u>: Bruce Frier distributed a Call for Papers for the 2004 meeting, to be held in Ann Arbor on May 7 - 9. The theme will be "Perceptions of Change: In the Ancient World, Of the Ancient World." There will be a combination of plenary and concurrent sessions as well as visits to museums.

<u>New Business</u>: Roberts relayed an invitation from Ian Worthington and Larry Okamura to hold the 2005 meeting at the University of Missouri at Columbia. Immediately following the meeting there will be an Alexander Symposium. MSP (Spaar, Meckler) to accept the invitation.

MSP (Kron, Ward) to waive the 2-week rule. Roberts reported on several options which have been proposed for the AAH to respond to the situation with Iraqi antiquities, and distributed on an on-line petition that members can sign and a copy of a proposed resolution from Joa Todd. MSP (Meckler, MacMullen) that Roberts write a letter on behalf of the organization.

MSP (Cargill, Teeter) that she explain to Todd that the AAH had insufficient time to approve her petition but that the appropriate material be included in the President's letter.

MSP (Talbert, Frier) the following resolution: "Although I had imagined that immediate past presidents were free to lapse into a state of carefree forgetfulness, I am in fact happy to accept my successor's invitation to propose the vote of thanks, because I did play some part in arranging that UNB Fredericton should be our meeting-place in 2003. Among all those who merit thanks, I mention first ourselves. Ancient historians like to contemplate the *fines terrarum*, and sometimes to travel there. This meeting-place is the Association's easternmost to date, and many travellers' tales have been exchanged about how we each reached here; a rich store of anecdotes has been created to shape, polish, and garble. Without question, in this venture to the True North we have been impressed: UNB's tradition of teaching and scholarship extends as far back as 1785, further even than that of UNC, Chapel Hill, which prides itself on being the first public university in the United States. 
