2023 Call for Papers (Deadline: December 1, 2022)

Abstracts for papers on any topic in ancient history, or related to the teaching and reception of ancient history, are actively encouraged. Paper sessions will be plenary and in-person, with papers of 15-20 minutes in length, and will include discussion. We particularly welcome papers that engage with the following potential panel topics, broadly construed:

- Ancient Responses to Environmental Change
- Beyond Enslavement: Navigating Emancipation in Antiquity
- Competition and Revision in the Commemoration of Ancient Wars
- Invective and Economic History
- Prisons and Imprisonment in Ancient Thought and Practice
- Sacred Law in the Ancient World

In addition, the AAH Diversity Committee invites submissions for a panel on “The Feminist Turn in Ancient Military History.” Papers might consider, for instance, how the actions of women in economic, religious, and domestic spheres influenced ancient warfare, how women experienced, processed, and responded to realities of warfare, how our sources, both literary and material, represent and frame women who participated in and were affected by warfare, as well as how various intersections (including but not limited to race, ethnicity, class, age) shape both approaches and answers to these questions.

Please send abstracts of no more than 500 words, as well as any questions, to 2023AAH@gmail.com. The deadline for abstract submission is December 1, 2022. Bibliographic entries are not included in the word count. Abstracts should be sent as a single .pdf; we encourage anonymous submission but the inclusion of individual or identifying information, which we recognize may be relevant to a given inquiry, will not disqualify submissions.

All conference events will take place on campus at Florida State, with Friday and Saturday’s paper sessions held at the Augustus Turnbull Conference Center. A block of rooms has been reserved at the Doubletree Hotel in Tallahassee, located a half-mile from the Conference Center; transportation will be available. IN MEMORIAM: Gocha Tsetsckhladze (1963-2022)

Stan Burstein sent this news of former member Dr. Gocha Tsetsckhladze, who died on September 10, 2022 after a long illness. He was a distinguished archaeologist and an outstanding historian of the Greeks in the Black Sea in the tradition of M. I. Rostovtzeff, the author and editor of numerous books, and the founder and editor of the journal *Ancient West & East* and the series *Colloquia Antiqua*. He was a student of John Boardman.
